

Rural Moroccan Youths Complain About Marginalisation

1 Life is hard for young Moroccans living in the countryside. Options for jobs and leisure are more limited than those their urban age-mates are provided. The government has marginalized **them** economically and culturally, young people from those areas complain. "I have a lot of ambitions, but there's no support," Said Chentoui, a 24-year-old unemployed graduate from Moulay Bouselham, told Magharebia. "We need appropriate guidance to start specific projects in rural areas, which will enable us to stay at home and develop the countryside. A lot of my friends have had to move to the cities to find work and self-satisfaction," he said. "It is time," he added, "for government officials to pay more attention to the well-being of rural youth." He chose to stay in his home village. Since he hasn't had the good luck to find a job in his field of study, he is now thinking of starting his own business.

2 According to official figures, the agricultural sector employs 72.1 per cent of the working population in rural areas. Still, about 30 per cent of rural males aged 15 to 29 were unemployed, a 2012 World Bank study found. The situation is even worse for young women. Nine out of 10 were out of work or out of school, the report said. There is also little for these young people to do. "The only way young people in rural areas can have fun is to go to cities or villages to take part in cultural activities," sociologist Safae Moucharrarf told Magharebia. "So the government ought to form partnerships with local officials if they want to create cultural and sports facilities for young people, because of the positive effects these have on the quality of life," **she** added.

3 "**They** are victims of marginalisation and suffer a lot from poverty. The government must focus on them by providing sports centres, among other things," some politicians said. "Partnerships with local authorities can help the government to put the desired infrastructure in place. Young people need to be trained and given guidance to start their own projects. Awareness-raising and communication are also vital," they added.

4 Ouzzine agreed that much needed to be done for youths in both rural and urban areas. "There is a big gap, which we're trying to bridge to achieve a kind of equal opportunities between regions. It is important to get young people involved in local politics," the minister said. "All the ministries need to cooperate and focus more on rural youths," Ouzzine stressed. "Even the self-employment scheme will increasingly target young people in rural areas," he said, referring to Morocco's Moukawalati entrepreneurship initiative.
